The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program recognizes public and private elementary, middle, and high schools based on their overall academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. Every year the U. S. Department of Education seeks out and celebrates great American schools, schools demonstrating that all students can achieve to high levels. In South Dakota, the Department of Education is able to nominate three schools to become a National Blue Ribbon school. One of these three schools must have a high percentage of students from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Each year, The State Department of Education generates a list based on a school being in the top 15% of schools using on a combined percentage from performance on ELA and Math SD state assessments. In addition, a school also has to have at least 10 students in each tested grade and has to meet state performance the year they are nominated and the year the will receive the award. We also look at past year's performance to see if a school traditionally scores well over time. In addition, a high school must also be in the top 15% for graduation rate. There cannot be any complaints against the school for civil rights and SPED violations. If a school had any testing irregularities or on-going accreditation issues, they will be removed from the eligibility list.

Once the committee approves schools from the list, the SD DOE informs schools that they will be nominated for the award. If that nomination is accepted, they then go through a lengthy application process with US DOE. Once a school receives the National Blue Ribbon award, they have to wait five years before being eligible again. Corsica-Stickney Elementary was nominated in the Exemplary High Performing School Category.

Being a National Blue Ribbon school is an absolute high honor. We work every day to deliver a first rate education to our students here at Corsica-Stickney Elementary. We spend a lot of time looking at our student data and strive to make sure we are meeting the needs of all of our students. By receiving the National Blue Ribbon Award, it truly validates all of the work that is put in, and certainly says so much about our students and school communities. It is truly a group effort and we are so proud of the students and staff here at Corsica-Stickney Elementary.




Retirement of Colors

Special Speaker Visit

Mt. Vernon and Corsica-Stickney JH & HS students traveled to the Plankinton school to join the student there to listen to US Navy Master Chief Special Warfare Operator Edward Byers Jr. After more than 22 years in the Navy, Mr. Byers has a long list of awards and honors including a Purple Heart and a Congressional Medal of Honor. Byers told the audience about the strenuous training he overcame to become a Navy Seal and how we are to continue to get back up after being knocked down. That perseverance, courage, patriotism, integrity, sacrifice and citizenship are invaluable character assets that we all can benefit from in our daily lives. He recounted the events in the Middle East as his SEAL team worked to rescue an American citizen who was abducted along with others. One of Byers comrades was killed during the mission and explained how that event changed him, both as a soldier and as a person.
