Top 10 Benefits of Reading for fun Everyday

The American Library Association has found a strong connection between daily independent reading and overall student performance. Here are the top 10 benefits of independent reading on a daily basis.

- 1. **Reading exercises our brain** Reading is a much more complex task for the brain rather than watching TV. Reading strengthens brain connections and builds NEW connections.
- 2. Students who read often get better at it- Practice makes perfect in almost everything students do and reading is NO different.
- 3. **Reading teaches students about the world around them** By reading a variety of books, students learn about people, places and events all around the world.
- 4. **Reading IMPROVES concentration** Students have to sit still and quietly so they can focus on the story when reading. If they read often, they will develop the skills to do this longer.
- Reading develops a student's imagination When students read their brains translate the descriptions we read of people, places and things into pictures. When students are engaged in a story they are imagining how a character looks and is feeling. Students then bring this knowledge into their daily lives.
- 6. **Reading IMPROVES vocabulary and language skills** Students learn new words as they read. They learn how to structure sentences and how to use words and other language features in their writing and speaking.
- 7. **Reading is FUN** A book doesn't take up much space, so students can take them anywhere and never be bored.
- 8. **Reading helps a child develop EMPATHY** As students develop they begin to imagine how they would feel in that situation they are reading about.
- 9. **Reading is a GREAT way to spend time TOGETHER** Reading together, bedtime stories and visiting a library are great ways of spending time together.
- Children who read often ACHIEVE better in SCHOOL Reading promotes achievement in all subjects, not just English. Students who are good readers tend to achieve better across the curriculum.



Mrs. Hosman's 2nd graders headed to the science lab to learn how to use different scientific tools to measure a variety of materials. They had to estimate how many drops of water a penny would hold and then do the experiment to see how close they guessed. They learned the difference between rulers, yardsticks, tape measures and when to use each item. They observed sugar and salt with a magnifying lens to try to tell the difference between them. They found out cotton balls don't weigh much compared to blocks. The students had to predict how many scoops of beans it would take to fill a jar and test it out to see how close their predictions were to the actual results.











Miss Waldner's Kindergarten class trekked upstairs to the science lab to take their turn at learning about science lab tools as well. They got to practice using the balances by placing different weighted


items on each side of the balance. The hand lens was next as they examined different shapes. Dropping one water drop at a time with an eye dropper was a struggle for some and the concentration was intense! They also compared two different thermometers to read the differences

between them, one at room temperature and one from a cold freezer.





Science Lab



Mrs. Olsen's fifth grade class is wrapping up their unit on matter. This unit focused on the properties of matter and identifying matter as a solid, liquid or gas. The final lab for the unit gave students the opportunity to test 5 physical properties of matter: color,

hardness, magnetism, electrical conductivity, and solubility. Students put a penny, glass beaker, sugar cubes, and a lemon to the test. The lab was enjoyed by all!
