












They made observations about different objects, measured liquids, weighed items and used magnifying glasses to see things up close.


































The **second graders** were in the science lab learning about the scientific method. They practiced using tools that scientists use when they are working to solve problems. They all worked very diligently to make sure the measurements were precise.















The past couple weeks the students in grades K-6 have been taking the MAP Growth tests. Our elementary is using the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA's) MAP assessments this year to monitor student progress and proficiency. MAP, stands for Measures of Academic Progress. The students took computerized tests that are adaptive and offered in the areas of Reading, Language Usage, and Mathematics.

When taking a MAP test, the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answers all the previous questions. As the student answers correctly, questions become more difficult. If the student answers incorrectly, the questions become easier. In an optimal test, a student answers approximately half the items correctly and half incorrectly. The final score is an estimate of the student's achievement level.

We teachers will be using these assessments to measure your student's progress and growth on basic skills throughout the school year as well as a tool to drive our instruction in the classroom. We will identify areas of weakness in order to devote more time and practice with those skills in our classrooms. We will also see their strengths and use those strengths to build upon. Students and teachers will use the data to set goals for the year as well.

We will be sharing the results of this testing with the parents at our first parent teacher conferences scheduled in October.

We feel that this testing will benefit our students and will hopefully show growth and increase proficiency by the end of the year. It will also help our teachers gear and focus their instruction in the classroom.





Lorisa Broughton started coaching and teaching at Corsica Public Schools in 1995. In 1998 she became the head girls' basketball coach at Corsica. In 2010 Corsica and Stickney formed a coop in basketball and she was named the head coach of Corsica-

Stickney. During her tenure, her teams have made three State B Girls' Basketball Tournament appearances. In 2011 her team brought home the consolation championship, in 2019 they placed 3rd, and in 2020 made the final four until the rest of the tournament was cancelled due to COVID 19. Broughton was name Region 7 Girls' Basketball Coach of the Year in 2019 and 2020 by the SDBBCA. "I am extremely honored to receive this award," Broughton said. "I would like to thank all my athlete's past and present, my assistant coaches, and fellow South Dakota basketball coaches for all their contributions to our program and the sport of basketball in the state. I would like to also thank the communities of Corsica and Stickney for all the support the team receives and my family for their support and understanding during the basketball season."
