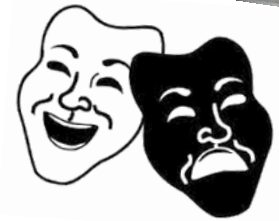

These students will be under the watchful eye of Mrs. Paulson. You can watch the performances on SDPB TV on the day and again rebroadcast on Thanksgiving Day.



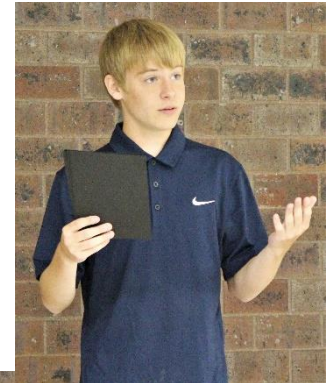

Season of Thanksgiving!



We are a Title I school here at Corsica-Stickney Elementary. We are bound by the laws and guidelines set up by the Federal Government. ESSA or Every Child Succeeds Act of 2015.

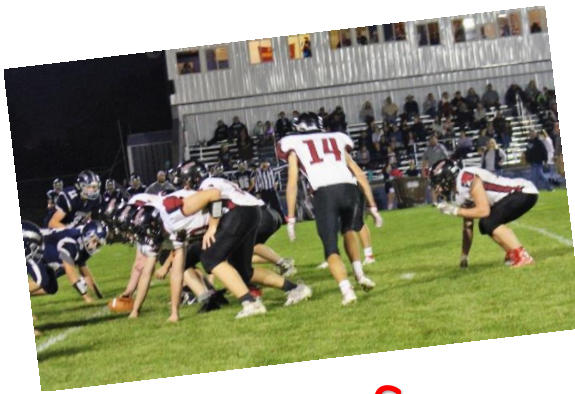

Science Lab



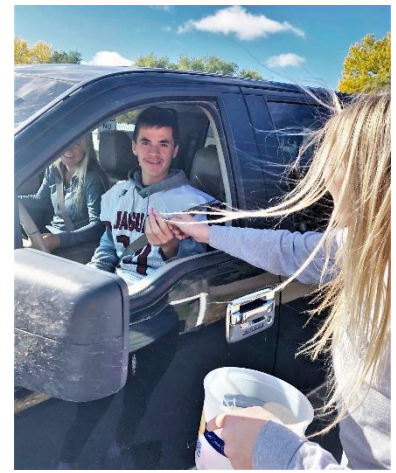
Mrs. Hosman's second graders headed to the science lab to learn about animal coverings and adaptations. They also tried their hands at being archeologists.

The students learned about fossils. Fossils are formed in different ways, and there are different types archeologists find. In these pictures the second graders were doing a mock fossil dig like a real archeologist would. They were challenged with getting the chocolate chips out of a cooking by poling and brushing the crumbs, so not to damage the chip. It wasn't as easy as it looked!

The students then looked at different types of animals and the adaptations they have that help them survive and protect them. We learned that Arctic Terns have an adaptation that allows them to sleep while they are flying their very long migration patterns. Polar bears have blubber to help keep them warm. They tested what effect of a layer of insulating fat would have by placing their hands in ice water...one in a glove of lard and one bare....brrrr.

Students also enjoyed touching and examining the various skins and leathers brought in by Mrs. Schumacher.



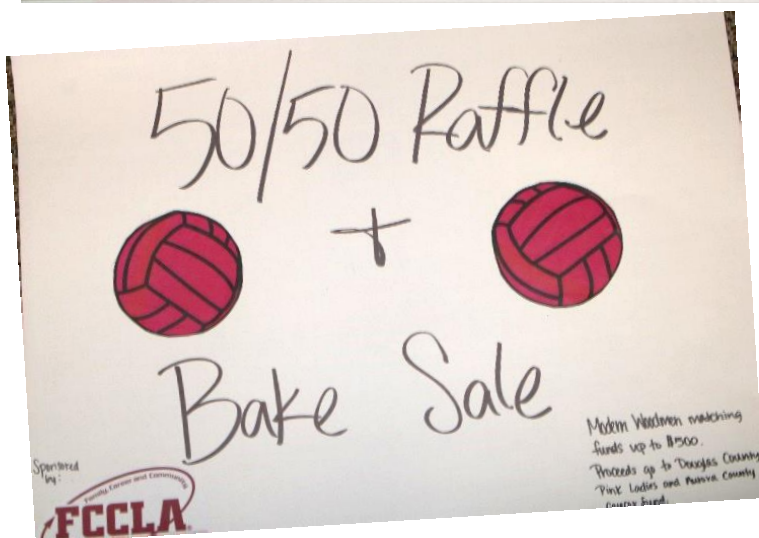


FCCLA has been busy this month!
