Many people doubted the Comets ability to beat Plankinton after a 49-41 victory over the Kimball Coyotes. But the Comets were hot Friday night as they defeated the Plankinton Pirates 60-49 enabling them to advance to the championship round of play on Saturday night, January 8.

The game started off similar to most championship games, both teams and cheering sections were fired-up and ready for action. After the first quarter of the game everyone looked for a close exciting game but it wasn't long before the Comets took the lead. However, it wasn't until the first part of the fourth quarter when the Comets pulled thirty points ahead of the Rustlers that the Comets realized that they were about to win their first championship trophy. 



CHS SAFETY COUNCIL HAPPILY REPORTS!


