Driving on icy or snow-covered roads requires far more sens tive care handling than the average motorist exercises on dry surfaces.

PLAY IT COOL: Follow these helpful hints.

*Use a lighter touch on the brake, accelerator, and steering wheel

*Accelerate slowly and gradually to avoid spinning the wheels


*Try to avoid situations in which quick stops may be necessary

*Pump brakes gently to maintian steering control and to prevent the car from going into a skid when you stop

*Negoticise corners gingerly to avoid a skid-starting jerk of the steering wheel

*If you should go into a skid, turn the steering wheel gently in the direction of the skid. Then, after directional control is established, reduce your speed by braking gently, and returning to your planned route

*Keep your seat belt fastened at all times

The Eagles were led by Jansen, Judet, and Ernster.




