PLOOSTER, BAMBERG GIVE REPORTS.



Brent DeBoer opened the scoring for the Comets with a

20-yard scamper to paydirt in the first quarter.

The Wildcats soon took control with their superb passing ability as they threw the ball for 239 yards. The Wildcats' offensive efforts started as quarterback Alvin Mayer threw three touchdown passes to Steve Brosz. Mayer again tossed the ball for a 55-yard touchdown pass to Merlyn Herr in the second half. The Wildcats' only yards rushing came as Maurice Reiner outran the Comets for a 42-yard touchdown.

The Comets! second touchdown came in the third quarter as Brent DeBoer found Alan Zwart with a 30-yard

touchdown pass.

The Comets gained six first downs compared to Tripp's two first downs; however the main factor proved to be and Alvin Mayer grabbed interceptions as Steve Brosz five of the Comets' passes. The game proved to be mainly offensive as the Comets gained 294 yards total for the game, while Tripp gained 281 yards total.
