
candidates, the other two were Keith Sprecher and Rod Schrank

After coronation a snake dance was led by the cheerleaders. Many members of the pep club took part in this wild chase up and down main street and through business places yelling for the Comet team.



FROSH TAKE TESTS

On Monday, Oct, 4th, the Corsica High School freshmen students were given the Lorge-Thorndike Mental Ability test by Mr. Billars, guidance director.

This test is one of the group of tests required statewide of all incoming high school freshmen. Each test consists of two parts—a verbal battery and nonverbal battery. The results of this test indicates the scholastic aptitude for each student, thus enabling the teachers to better set realistic standards for each student.

TAKEN

The ITED Test (Iowa Test of Educational Development was given Sept. 27th to the members of the freshmen and junior classes by Mr. Billars. ITED is a state—wide test requiring approximately one day to administer, and it is required to be taken by all high school freshmen and juniors in the state.

This assessment survey consists of eight separate tests, each dealing with abilities important to success in school and life in general. These tests concentrate on broad intellectual skills an understandings and on the ability to use what has been learned. Little emphasis is placed on the knowledge of names, dates, and The results of formulas. these tests enable teachers to see what areas of the curriculum the students progress satisfactorily and in which areas they

(It measures ability to read

science material and understanding of facts, principles, applications, and generalizations drown from biological, physical, and earth science. Use of Sources - measures the student's familiarity with, his/her atility to use, important library references and other sources of imformation.

All colleges in South Dakota, and many other coleges throughout the nation, require the incoming freshmen to forward results of the ITED tests before registration and acceptance.

CHS SAFETY COUNCIL WANTS YOU TO THINK OF WHAT ONE SECOND CAN DO!

If you are going to be one of the fatal statistics in the massacre on our highways, you should know that it will be all over in about seven-tenths of a second. This is the way it will happen if your car, traveling only 55 miles an hour, smashes headlong into a tree.

One-Tenth of a Second
The front bumper and chrome "frosting" of the grill work collapse. Slivers of steel penetrate the tree to a depth of one and one-half inches or more.

Two-Tenths of a Second
The hood crumples as it rises, smashing into the windshield. Spinning rear wheels leave the ground. The fenders come into contact with the tree, forcing rear parts out over front doors. Heavy structural members of the car begin to act as a brake on the terrific forward momentum of the two-and-one-half ton car. But your body continues to move forward at the vehicle's orginial speed (20 times the normal force of gravity, your body weight: 3,200 pounds). Your legs ramrod straight, snap at knee joints.

Three-Tenths of a Second Your body is now off the seat, torso upright, broken knees pressing against the dash board. The plastic and steel frame of the steering wheel begins to bend under a terrible death grip. Your head is now near the sun visor, your chest above the steering column.

Four-Tenths of a Second
The car's front 24 inches have been demolished, but the rear end is still traveling at an estimated speed of 35 miles per hour. Your body is still traveling 55 miles per hour. The half-ton motor block crunches into the tree. The rear of the car, like a bucking horse, rises high enough to scrape off lower branches.

Five-Tenths of a Second
Your fear-frozen hands bend the steering column into an almost vertical position.
Force of gravity impales you on the steering shaft. Jagged steel puncture lung and intercostal arteries. Blood spurts into your lungs.

Six-Tenths of a Second Your feet are ripped from your tightly-laced shoes, or your "loafers" go flying. The brake pedal shears off at the floor boards. The chassis bends in the middle, shearing body bolts. Your head smashes into the windshield. The rear of the car begins its downward fall, spinning wheels digging into the ground.

Seven-Tenths of a Second
The entire, writhing body of the car is forced out of shape. Hinges tear, doors spring open. In one last convulsion, the seat rams forward, pinning you against the cruel steel of the stering shaft. Blood leaps from your mouth, shock has frozen your heart. You are now dead!----Better Drive Carefully----Don't you agree?
