

by Martena Spaans "Get really stoned; drink wet cement," was a quip that you may have heard from Mr. Robert Short, Executive Director of Alcohol, Narcotics Education Association. The posters were amusing byt they held "Speed great meaning. Kills" and "Drugs are for Swingers" were among them.

He showed how one drug may lead to another in your daily routine life.

Heroin, an opiate, comes from the milk of the seed of a poppy which grows in Turkey and Mexico. Becoming addicted to heroin is a rapid process and the dependency is both physical and psychological. Two hundred dollars a day have been paid just to get the drug and prevent withdrawal symptoms that may light from three days to one week.

The big question is marijuana. Why? Because people are interested and curious, and it grows in most localities.
