
Barbara's selection was on the basis of an application, recommendation from the fac-ulty and the American Legion Auxiliary, and samples of her news. interview, and editor-

Rocky Maunders with 18 points, Jay DeWaard with 17, and Ron VandenBerge with 10 were Corsica's double-figure men in the game.


Top rebounders for the Comets were Gary Hoekman and Jay De Waard.


