





As far as the high school faculty goes, I am just beginning to get to know them. For not knowing them very well, I also like them


quite well.

NMSQT TEST

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test will be taken by about 20 Corsica High School juniors, on Tuesday morning Febuary 16. The test is voluntary and available to all those who wish to take it.

The NMSQT consists of four tests measuring broad aspects of educational development in basic academic areas: English usage, mathematics usage. social studies, natural sciences, reading comprehension and word usage. It is designed to measure the cumulative effect of educational experiences and the student's ability to apply his knowledge. The student must show what he can do and what he has learned. The testing time is 2 hours and 10 minutes.

Students with the highest scores in each of the fifty states will be eligible for competition for merit scholarships ranging from \$250.00 to \$1500.00 per year.


CORSICA TO DATTLE




