

'inexperienced' but 'talented'

Practice is underway for "Brother Goose", a three-act comedy by William Davidson. The production is scheduled for April 9 and 10.

Composing the twelve member cast are Jim Beukelman (Jeff Adams), Gina Dockendorf (Carol

Adams), Bryan King (Wes Adams), Michelle Drefs (Hy Adams), Denise Eggers (Mrs. Lumpkins), Jeanine Ralston (Peggy Winkel), Brenda Buck (Mrs. Trimmer), Linda Beukelman (Mrs. Mason), Laura Punt (Eve Mason), Wyla Punt (Alice), Brenda Zomer (Lenore Hudson) and Doug Beukelman (truck driver).

The plot of "Brother Goose" centers around Jeff, the inexperienced head of the family who finds the responsibility of rearing the three younger Adamses can become rather trying at times. The task becomes more complicated when Lenore Hudson, a newly made millionaire, steps into the picture with her plans to "take Jeff away from all this."

This dilemma is smoothed over with the appearance of Peggy Winkel. She and Hy form an alliance against Lenore, and together they manage to save Hy's football game and rescue Jeff from Lenore's clutches.

her cast is very cooperative and the practices are going really well.

Playoffs become reality

After approximately 15 years of pushing for playoffs, proponents who were refused twice by the Legislature and saw playoffs voted down by school boards will finally see playoffs become a reality.

The vote came after 12 frustrated football players sued the SDHSAA because they felt they were being denied their constitutional rights. The players said they were being discriminated against by not having football playoffs because the college scouts and coaches could not watch them in championship competition.

The SDHSAA interpreted the Activities Association's constitution as needing a two-thirds vote of all schools to amend the law. However, proponents of the playoffs said they wanted to repeal the law, not amend it and their constitution has no guidelines on what percentage of a vote is needed to repeal it.

Minnehaha County Circuit Court Judge Robert C. Hegge ruled that the ban could be lifted by the 58 percent majority of the member schools which voted in favor of playoffs last June.

After Judge Hegge's ruling, the South Dakota High School Activities Association's Board of Controls decided in a 5-2 majority vote not to appeal the court's decision.

Some planning has already been done in anticipation of a reversal of the ban, but it is not certain if the playoffs will take place this fall

Under President Reagan's proposed budget cuts school lunch prices may increase considerably in the future, according to Irma Beukelman, business manager for Corsica High School.

Presently the school lunch program provides hot meals to students, faculty, and administration at 65¢ for grade school students, 70¢ for high school students, and \$1.20 for adults.

"For each paid meal, the school is reimbursed 16¢ plus 15¢ for food commodities," said Beukelman. "Tentatively, if the program should go into effect, the paid meals and the food commodities would no longer be

reimbursed to the school."

The lunch program also provides hot lunches for free and reduced prices to approximately forty students. The proposed budget cuts already caused reduced lunch prices to be raised from the current 10¢ per meal to 20¢ per meal, January 1, and would cause the income guidelines for both free and reduced lunches to be raised in the future.


"We would have to raise lunch prices to keep our program going," said Beukelman. "I don't think we would reduce our staff, but it depends on how many students continue eating the hot lunches. Right now we need all of the staff that we have."



Corsica High School started its 1981 track season March 17, as 10 boys and 20 girls reported for practice.

Coach Dennis De Boer replied when asked his views on the upcoming track season, "Due to the lack of numbers out for track, it will be hard to challenge any other teams in the conference for the title. But the students that we do have out are working hard, and hopefully we can qualify someone for the state.

The 10 boys that make up this year's version of the CHS boys' track team are seniors: Doug De Geest, Tom Dockendorf, Chuck Noteboom, Doug Olivier; juniors: Jerry Beukelman, Lowell Groeneweg, Curt Wagner; freshmen: Dan De Vries, David Fey and Steve Noteboom.

The 20 girls to report for Coach Doug Hookie's track squad are senior: Julie Hoekman; juniors:

Cherie Bakker, Sharlene Drefs; freshmen: Michelle Drefs. Shanon Noteboom, Robin Schoon, Vanden Hoek, Kristi Wagner; eighth graders: Kristie Bakker, Jodel Batterman, Donna Olson, Holly Van Roekel; seventh graders: Lorisa Bamberg, Kristine Bordewyk, Debbie De Geest, Becky Hoogendoorn, Lisa Peters, Marla Scholten, Tracy Vanden Hoek and Melissa Van Maanen.

About his girls' team Coach Hookie said, "We have 20 girls out for track, only three of them upperclassmen. We should do well in the distance races, especially the two-mile relay where we have all four runners finish in the State Track Meet finish in the State Track Meet returning. Cagers end season at 14-5

The Comet cagers wound up their 1980-81 campaign with a loss to eventual state champion Stickney in the District 27 Tourney for a final 14-5 slate marking.

Teamwise, the roundballers chalked up some impressive statistics with 1265 total points' 707 rebounds, and 262 assists. For the year they shot 47 percent on 549 of 1178 from the field and 167 of 271 charity tosses for 62 percent. Rebounding saw the team yank down 274 offensive and 433 defensive caroms.

The Comets averaged 66.5 points per game while allowing 54.7 (1040 total) for an average winning margin of 11.8 points. Their 14-5 record computes to a winning percentile of 74 percent.

Inidividual scoring honors went to 5 ft. 11 in. senior guard Tom Dockendorf as he averaged 19.7 (374 total) counters per game. Doug Olivier, 6 ft. 5 in. senior pivotman and 6 ft. 1 in. senior forward Chuck Noteboom followed with 16.1 (307 total) and 13.4 (255 total) averages. respectively. Free throw honors also went to Dockendorf as he hit at a 71 percent clip on 46-65 followed by Olivier's 43-67 for a 64 percent average.

Olivier led the Comets in boardwork as he tore down 216

strays for an 11.3 average and his fourth consecutive rebounding crown. Noteboom chipped in with a 7.7 average from a 147 rebound total. Dockendorf led in the assist category with 82 handouts and a 4.3 average. He was trailed closely by 5 ft. 9 in. senior guard. Doug De Geest, who totaled 64 dishoffs for a per game average of

Coach Dennis De Boer, along with his four graduating veterans, feels that the season must be termed successful, but all agree that they would have liked it to last longer, "In terms of wins and losses, we had a successful season, but it ended all too abruptly with loss in districts," said. Dockendorf Noteboom both agree that they had successful and satisfying prep careers. "I'm very happy to have played on all winning teams, but it was a letdown not to advance in playoffs. Overall, I'm satisfied,' Dockendorf said. Noteboom heartily agreed.

Olivier feels almost identically but, "I guess my outlet is that I can look forward to playing in college. I don't know where yet but I'm going to give it my best shot."

Armour operated behind Mark Davenport and Pat Freidel, who had ten and nine points, respectively.

In the second round Corsica returned to win a narrow victory over New Holland to take third

Students to audition for choir

Four Corsica students will be auditioning for the eighth annual Choir at All-State Honors Mitchell Senior High on May 1.

Wyla Punt, Cindy Olawsky, Leanne De Vries and Lisa Gerlach are Corsica's participants.

"Honors Choir is the highest standard of choral excellence South Dakota can offer on the high school level. It is an 'honor' to be accepted into the group.

"Last year approximately 600 students auditioned and only 150 can be accepted. The calibar of music performed is very high as is the tone quality and overall musicianship of the group," said

Pam Buehner, vocal director.

Only sophomores and juniors are eligible to audition. All members of the Honors Choir must be a member of the local school ensemble and a student in good standing.

Auditions for the applicants contain three divisons: performance of a solo, a sightreading test and a written test.

The solo is judged on tone quality, projection, enunciation, dynamics and musicality.

"Since Honors Choir meets and practices for one week before performance, it gives sutdents an insight into the technical aspects of singing as can be experienced only by using the voice for long periods of time," said Buehner.

If the students are accepted, they will be attending a five day summer workshop on the South Dakota State University campus in Brookings.

About students' preparation, Buehner commented, "By the time the audition date arrives, I feel the students will be adequately prepared."

All-State Honors Choir is sponsored by the South Dakota Chapter of the American Choral Directors Association. Music Boosters will sponsor the accepted students.
