Catholics Capture Crown





---Safety Promoted at CHS ---

The week of March 17-21 was set aside by the Safety Council as the annual Safety week. On Monday, Mini posters were placed all around school. The posters had little sayings on them reminding everyone to drive carefully and to oberve all safety rules.

On Tuesday, the high school and some of the teachers took a quiz entitled, "Are You an Expert?", to test their knowledge on driving safety. If you are wondering why you got some of the questions wrong, the answers are here.

- 1. (b) One car-length for each 10 miles per hour. One car-length should compensate for an emergency stop and any advantage in braking distance the car ahead holds over yours.
- 2. (b) Dry. Dry roads are no guarantee of safety. Speed and careless driving are more dangerous than any road condition.
- 3. (a) Good. Inclement weather and unfavorable road conditions are in evidence in one out of five fatal accidents.
- 4. (c) Slow up on approach, then gradually pick up speed. Of course excessive speed increases the danger of upset, sidesway, and skidding.
- 5. (b) False. The first effect is psychological, in that judgement and inhibition are impaired, which may cause driving errors.
- 6. (b) False. They only make the person more awake and less intexicated. Alcohol is burned up at a constant rate and the process cannot be speeded up.
 - 7. (b) Pull over to the curb and rest awhile. Avoid starchy ifods, heavy meals and liquids! Drugs, which slow up reaction, are dangerous.
 - 8. (d) Pump the brake pedal gently but firmly, particularly on wet or icy pavement.
 - 9. (d) 40% of the time.
 - 10. (b) 8,000-10,000

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- 11. (b) Apply the brakes gently, or not at all. In case of a blowout, a sudden application of the brakes may cause the car to overturn.
- 12. (d) Speed, and speed too fast for road, weather and visibility conditions, is the most frequently reported cause of fatal accidents.
- 13. (d) Steer in the same direction that the rear of the car is sliding. This is true provided oncoming traffic and road conditions permit. Don't put on brakes or depress the clutch. It is better to stall your engine than to allow the car to waltz allower the road. Take your foot off the accelerator.
- 14. (c) Grip the wheel firmly, take your foot off the accelerator. Allow the engine to reduce speed to a safe point before applying brakes or depressing the clutch or attempting to steer back on the road.
 - 15. (c) Park parallel, crimp wheels to curb and set brake. When parking uphill, set front wheels to left against curb; downhill, set wheels to right. Put transmission in park (manual transmission in first if uphill, reverse if downhill).
 - 16. (b) Signal your intention, then back slowly after making sure roadway is clear. If possible, get a passerby to direct you. Never back your car up unless absolutely necessary.
 - 17. (d) Pull cautiously over to the right and stop.
 - 18. (b) In the garage, on the rubbish pile or hanging from a tree as a swing for the kids. Such a tire is a menace to the driver, his passengers, and everyone on the road.
 - 19. (b) Saving lives. Traffic violations are the major cause of accidents. Obey traffic laws and you'll not only avoid traffic tickets but you'll have a better chance to avoid injury or death.

- 20. (c) More than 89% of all accidents occur on straight level roads.
- 21. (a) Left hand at 9 or 10 o'clock, right hand at 2 or 3 o'clock. Good leverage assures constant control of direction of travel.

 - (c) Railroad crossing
 - (d) Yeild

If you got 20-22 right, you are an Expert: 16-19 right, you are Pretty Good. 12-15 right is Fair. 8-11 right is Poor.


