ADUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY



A. The Philosophy of the School System is one in which

We Believe:

- ...that the students welfare is our chief concern in developing the intellectual, social, physical, and vocational potential of each student.
- ...all children are basically good and have a desire to learn and, therefore, we should provide them with experiences to learn as a continual program.
- ...that each child should learn desirable mental attitudes and truths concerning life, rather than memorizing facts.
- ...that a sympathetic, cooperative attitude between the child, teacher, parent, and the community is necessary in the development of the student.
- ...the staff shall individualize the instructional components in implementing the curriculum, teaching and assisting as much as possible in order to maximize the individual potential of every student.
- ... the teacher is the most important factor in the educational program as a director of learning.
- ...that it is the schools responsibility to develop skills and attitudes that will lead to the worthy use of leisure time.
- ...that we should provide adequate facilities to inhance learning.
- B. The Board charges the Superintendent of Schools as its' Chief Administrative Officer, with the responsibility of executing their policies.
