The evening of April 17 and 18 saw the final production of the Corsica High Drama Department. The 3-act play was entitled "Down to Earth."



'PORTRAIT'"

Over the last 50 years, said the Institute, a total of 1,793,818 persons have died in traffic accidents --600,000 the total deaths resulting from all U.S. wars since the Revulutionary War and surpasses the combined current population of Alaska, Nevada, Wyoming and North Dakota.

It is not necessary explain how cutting to classes interferes with your schoolwork, because if it hurt only those of who skipped, there vou would be no need for anyone to complain. How does your skipping school interfere with the school work of the other students and the job of the teacher? Have you ever tried to teach a class of twenty-one when only eight or ten students are present? Or, have you ever tried to teach one student when twenty-three of a class of twenty-four is absent? The teachers are expected to keep these students occupied, but because of the large amount absent times, it is impossible to cover the day's assignment, for we would have to go over the same material when the majority of the class returned. Often times tests have to be called off because of the absence of too many students. It even hurts the class if two or three are missing, for the teacher and sometimes the entire class have to wait for a student to finish his make-up work (if he ever does!)

by Randy Dockendorf The CHS track team participated in four meets so far this year, those being at Minner, Bonesteel, Mitchell, and Stickney. The tracksters failed to place at Winner and Mitchell. but fared well at the Bonesteel and Raider Relays -- except that their methods of scoring was different. At Bone-Steel the individuals took over for Corsica. Tom Eggers placed fifth in the 220 vard dash with a time of 24.7 seconds. Mike Buck likewise got fifth in the 880 yard run, and runner in the 2 mile run. CHS placed two men in a pair of the events. Sam Reimnitz and Mike Buck came in third and fifth, respectively, in the 440 yard dash while Tom Eggers and Duane Vanden Hoek received first and fifth in the low hurdles.

The relays claimed honors for the Comets at the Raider . Relays with three thirds and a fourth recorded. The 880 yard relay (Kent, Tom, Dick, Rus) took 1:38.4, good for fourth place. The mile relay's (Arend, Sam, Dick, Rus) time of 3:41.1, earning them third place. The sprint medley's (Kent, Dick, Rus, Sam) time of 3:55.0 brought them third. The 2 mile relay turned out to be the highlight of the day. The quartet of Mike, Arend, Rus, and Sam broke the old school record of 8:45.7 set in 1971, with the new time of 8:42.8.


