Fines increase, laws become stricter

Inflation and safety are the prime reasons that South Dakota is cracking down on traffic violators, according to Douglas Pugh of the Douglas County sheriff's office.

In 1974 the speed limit on a two lane road was 70 m.p.h. during the day and 60 m.p.h. at night, while on the interstate, it was 75 m.p.h. during the day and 70 m.p.h. at night.

However, through an emergency conservation act, former President Richard M. Nixon set the national speed limit at 55 m.p.h. for all roads.

This year the fines have been raised anywhere from fifteen to fifty percent higher than previous ticket costs.

Whereas the old system of fines went by a mile per hour rate, the new method is a bracket type.

Also, any arrest for speeding that exceed 100 m.p.h. can result in a charge of reckless driving.

Pugh said that a good share of drivers drive over 55 m.p.h. and into the lower sixties.

He also said that the biggest reason for driving 55 is simply that it saves lives.

A full day's program has been set for the 1981 Press Convention to be held October 12 on the South Dakota State University Campus.

The journalism class will travel to Brookings in order to participate in the activities scheduled and to enter Corsica's Forum and the Comet in the 1981 Publications Contest.

The Press Convention will offer workshops on yearbooks, newspaper, and photography.

The workshop for Yearbook will include layout and design, trends and creativity in yearbooks, covering the school

year, and tips and techniques for yearbooks of 100 pages or less.

Information offered in the newspaper session will be on basic newspaper writing, finding news, and makeups for departmentals, mimeographs, and offset newspapers. Sportswriting, headline and feature writing will also be included.

The photography session will feature basic photography, selecting a camera, sports photography, darkroom techniques, and yearbook photography.

A writing contest and on-thespot photography contest will also be featured.

The convention will include awarding the 1981 All-State plaques, naming of Top-of-Class winners, and recognition of the All-State journalists from last summer's Publications Institute.

Corsica High juniors, Gina Dockendorf, Donna Metzger, and Julie Gerlach attended the Institute held at Brookings. They thought it was well worth the trip.


